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President's Report

2004-2005

Membership in TAAA&S is at 187 this year equal to last year. Overall, other states in the Southern Region are still seeing memberships declining. This is mostly due to early retirements and budget cuts.

The Southern Region has held a majority of the votes in the delegate session. This majority is in jeopardy of disappearing. A bigger concern is the overall decrease in membership. This is especially of importance because a majority of this decline is coming from "seasoned" agents.

This concern spills over into the state association. The Board sees a void in younger agents taking up leadership roles in the state association. There has been much discussion on how to compete with the agent's time and money to get them more involved. This is not limited to our association, the service club that I belong to is also searching for new volunteers to fulfill needed projects in the community. This is a constant activity for our club.

The board is having much discussion on methods to increase membership and participation. If you have a solution to this issue, please let your representative know.

Going to my first NACAA Annual Meeting and Professional Improvement Conference was a lot of fun. Since that time, I have made several friends and business acquaintances from other states. I look forward to networking with others in similar roles and comparing issues that are common to our jobs.

If you have never been to a National meeting, I suggest you get on board. One of the items under discussion is more financial incentives for getting more agents to attend.

By the way, the Southern Region is also the biggest contributor as host states for the National Meeting. In another 10 years or so, they will be looking for Tennessee to host another meeting. One issue the National Board is facing is how to get states to host a meeting. They are looking hard at the content and the cost to the host state to see if changes can be made.

Some of the activities we were involved in this past year are as follows.

We assisted TEAFCS with a Wine and Cheese hospitality at their National Meeting.

Mike Buschermohle and I attended the Public Issues Leadership Development conference in Washington, D.C. We had an opportunity to meet with many of our legislators and discuss the impacts that Extension is having in Tennessee.

Several of us cooked steaks at the Farm Bureau President's Conference. This is an ongoing tradition that I expect will continue.

We held the Legislative Ham Breakfast as planned. When I say as planned, I left out the near meltdown of the event due to the cafeteria in the Legislative Plaza being closed until the day before the breakfast. David

Yates, Ron Johnson, and Kevin Rose managed to cope with the situation. This is a joint effort with TEAFCS, TAE4-HW, and ESP. This is a lot of work. I am convinced we get a lot of mileage meeting with our State Legislators and thanking them for their support of UT and TSU Extension programs.

Alan Galloway and I attended the Southern Region Workshop in Nashville. After listening to the state of the “State” reports from our region, I can say that I am glad to be in Tennessee. There have been times when we might have felt things were a little lean here, but in many of the other states, they are backing up.

We hosted the VIP Dinner in Orlando last year.

Kentucky is asking for help in 2006 at the NACAA AM/PIC.

Joint Association State Meeting at Paris Landing in 2006. This event is still in the planning stages at this writing. An update should be given at this state meeting.

Tennessee will be nominating a Southern Region Vice-Director soon.

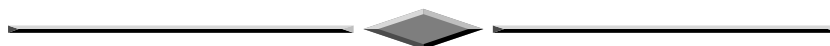

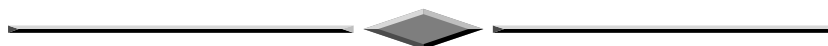

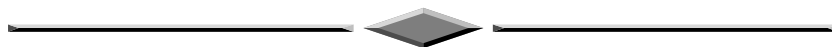
No new officers were elected, since there is no longer a Central District. The meeting was then adjourned.

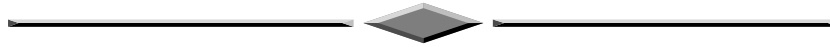

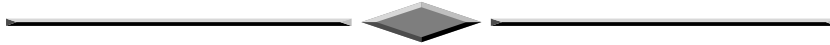

Many times these programs are relevant to all agents regardless of their tenure.

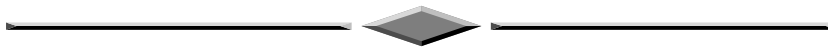
In 2004, The National Early Career Development Committee conducted a national survey of county agents to determine their professional development needs. The top five needs identified were: 1) Assessing & documenting program impacts; 2) Promoting local Extension programs and activities; 3) Developing an agricultural program identity; 4) Identifying funding sources for program development; and 5) Basics of grant writing. Results from the survey are posted on the national website.

National Goals and Objectives for 2004-2005:

- Solicit input from new NACAA members, newer agents (<10 years) and ECD State Chairs on training needs and expectations of NACAA. Encourage early career agents to attend ECD committee workshop.
- Develop means to encourage new and early career members to participate and continue involvement in state and national NACAA activities and the AM/PIC.

- Provide information on and increase understanding of professional and personal improvement opportunities through NACAA.
- Improve communications with new and early career members.
- Encourage the development and utilization of orientation and mentoring programs in individual states.

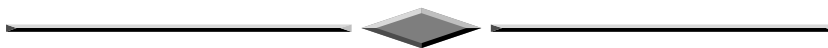

2005 State Communications Awards Communicator of the Year

The Fletcher Sweet Award honors the TAAA&S member who earns the title of Communicator of the Year. To be eligible, a member must enter at least four categories in the communications awards program. The winner is based on the number of entries and the quality of entries submitted. Sweet Award recipients must wait two years before they are eligible to receive this award again (see communications awards program procedures).

In Memoriam

The “Sweet Award” honors Mr. Fletcher Sweet, retired University of Tennessee Communications Specialist. Mr. Sweet began his career at the University of Tennessee in 1943 in the Public Relations/News Department on the main campus. Three years later, he came to the Agricultural Campus and the Extension Service as an Assistant Editor for the Information Department. In 1973, he became section leader of the Extension Communications section. He retired in 1974, and after a valiant battle with cancer, passed on December 20, 1995.

3. Number of district first place entries.
4. Number of entries placing 1st, 2nd, and 3rd in the district.
5. Total number of entries.

The Sweet Award winner receives a plaque and a \$100 cash award.

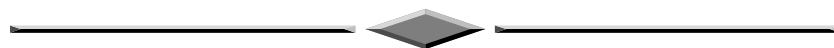
PROFESSIONAL EXCELLENCE COMMITTEE

2. Recipient must be a child of a TAAA&S member or Life Member in good standing with three or more years of TAAA&S membership.
3. Recipient can be of any major with preference given to (1) agriculture, (2) family and consumer science, and (3) other sciences.
4. Recipient can attend any university with preference given to attendance in the University of Tennessee system and the Tennessee Board of Regents system.
5. Preference given to year in college: (1) Freshman, (2) Sophomore, (3) Junior, (4) Senior.
6. Should there be no qualified applicants; two scholarships can be awarded the next year.
7. Selection committee should use other information on the scholarship application if needed to select recipient. eg.: leadership activities, grade average, etc.
8. If recipient attends the University of Tennessee, Knoxville majoring in agriculture, the scholarship should be awarded at the Agriculture Awards Banquet if possible. Otherwise, arrangements can be made for the presentation of the scholarship.
9. A recipient can receive the scholarship only one time.

Leon Dixon has represented life members as a non-voting member of the TAAA&S Board.

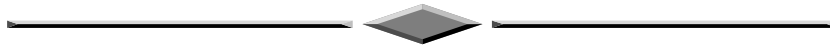

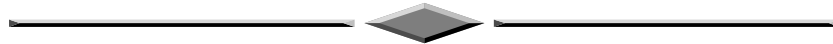
